*often called just "publics" or "PRPs"

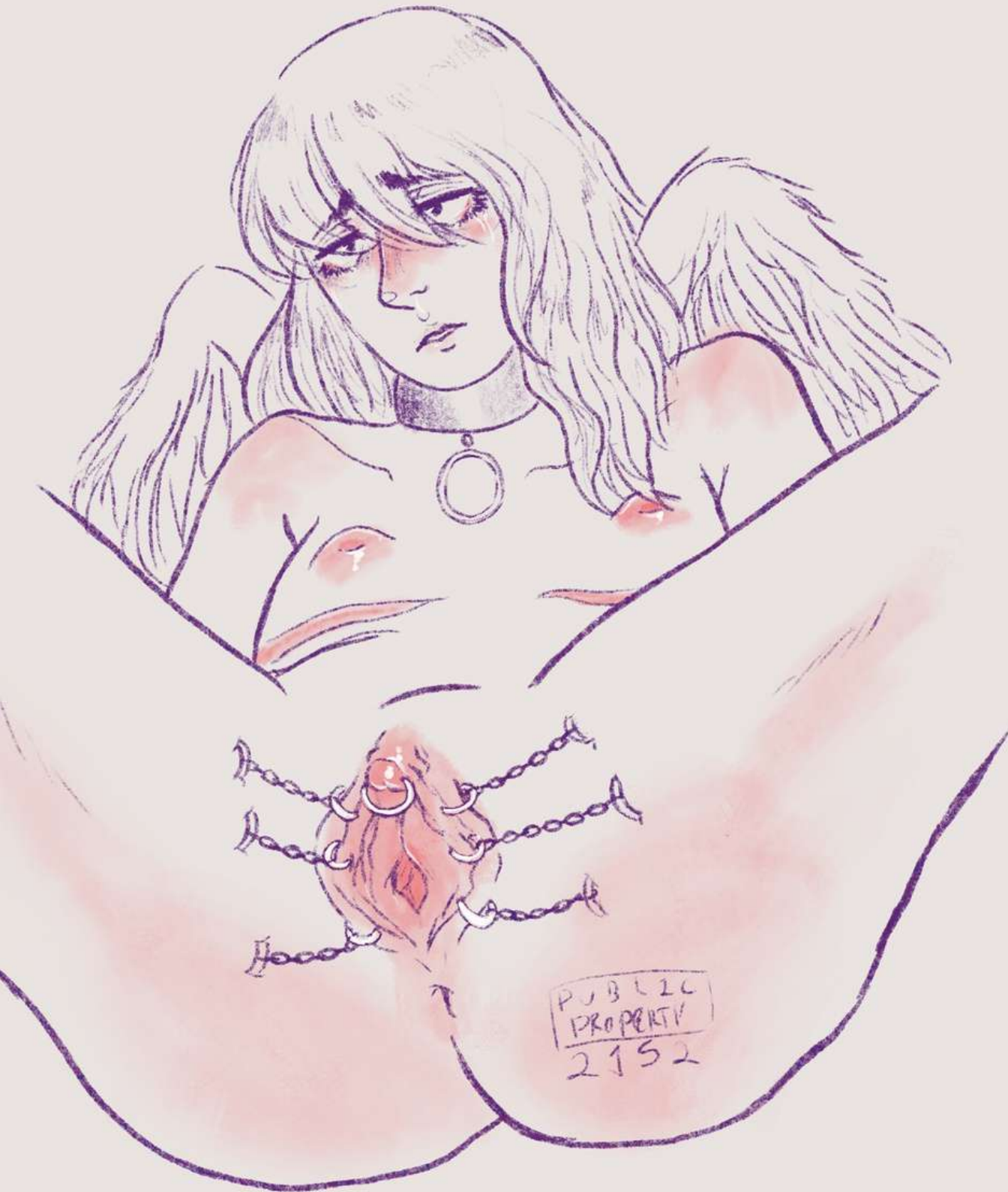
introduction

Pets who serve as public reliefs are considered state property. They have no demon owner, either due to not being bought or because their last one no longer wants/can take care of them. Only pet angels with a healing level above B+ are eligible to become public reliefs.

When using one, please be mindful of their healing levels, don't hurt them more than they can safely heal. Remember, destroying state property is a crime! A file with all of their specifications will be available at their post so anyone can freely check it.

They are a very important source of entertainment and stress relief for all of us and their installment has secured a peaceful and safe life for our citizens, so **please** remember to not put their lives at risk.

If you want to file a complaint or praise a particular PRF, just use their feedback box or wall! Trainers usually take public feedback into consideration when deciding the most appropriate training methods!



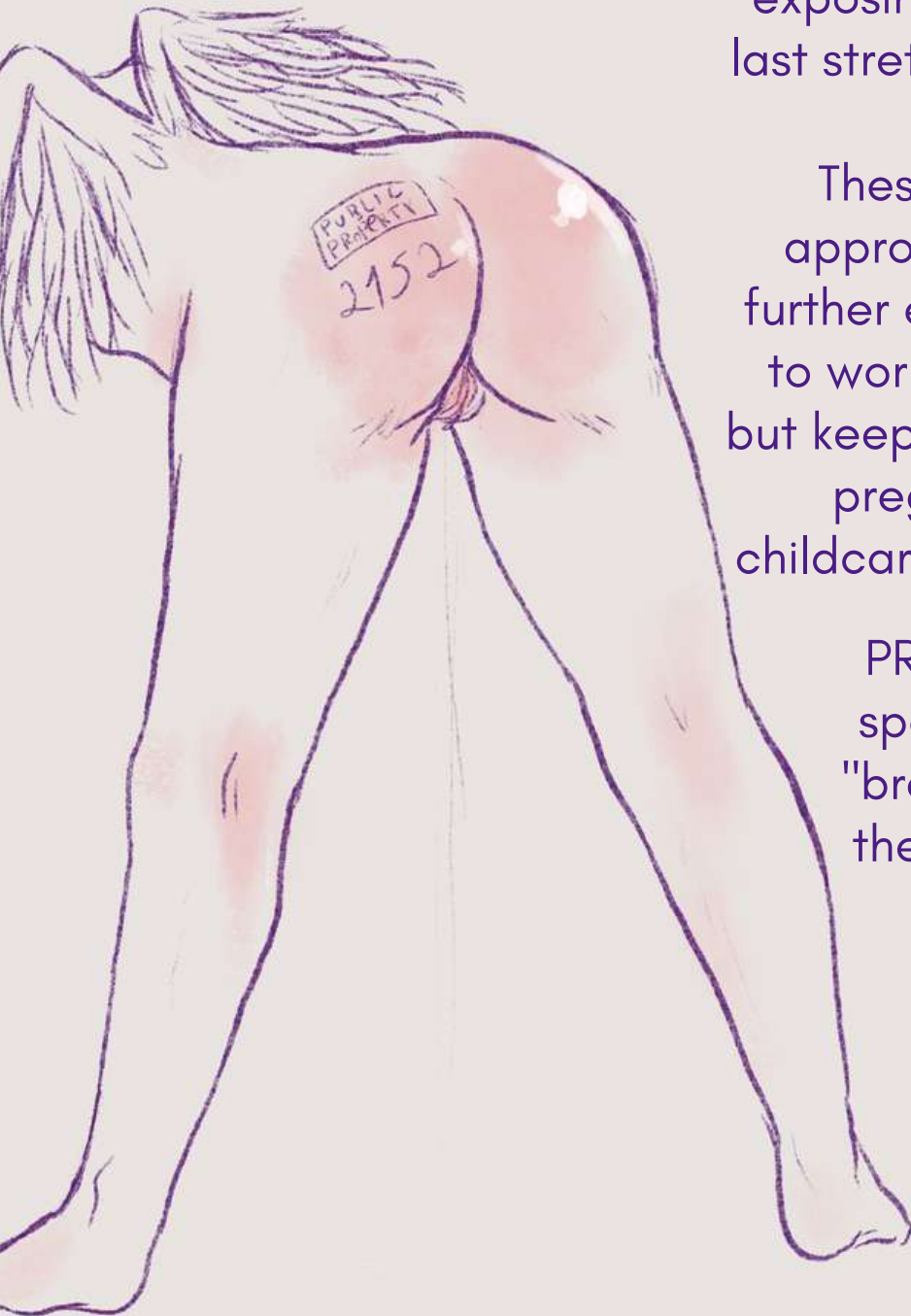
pillory pets

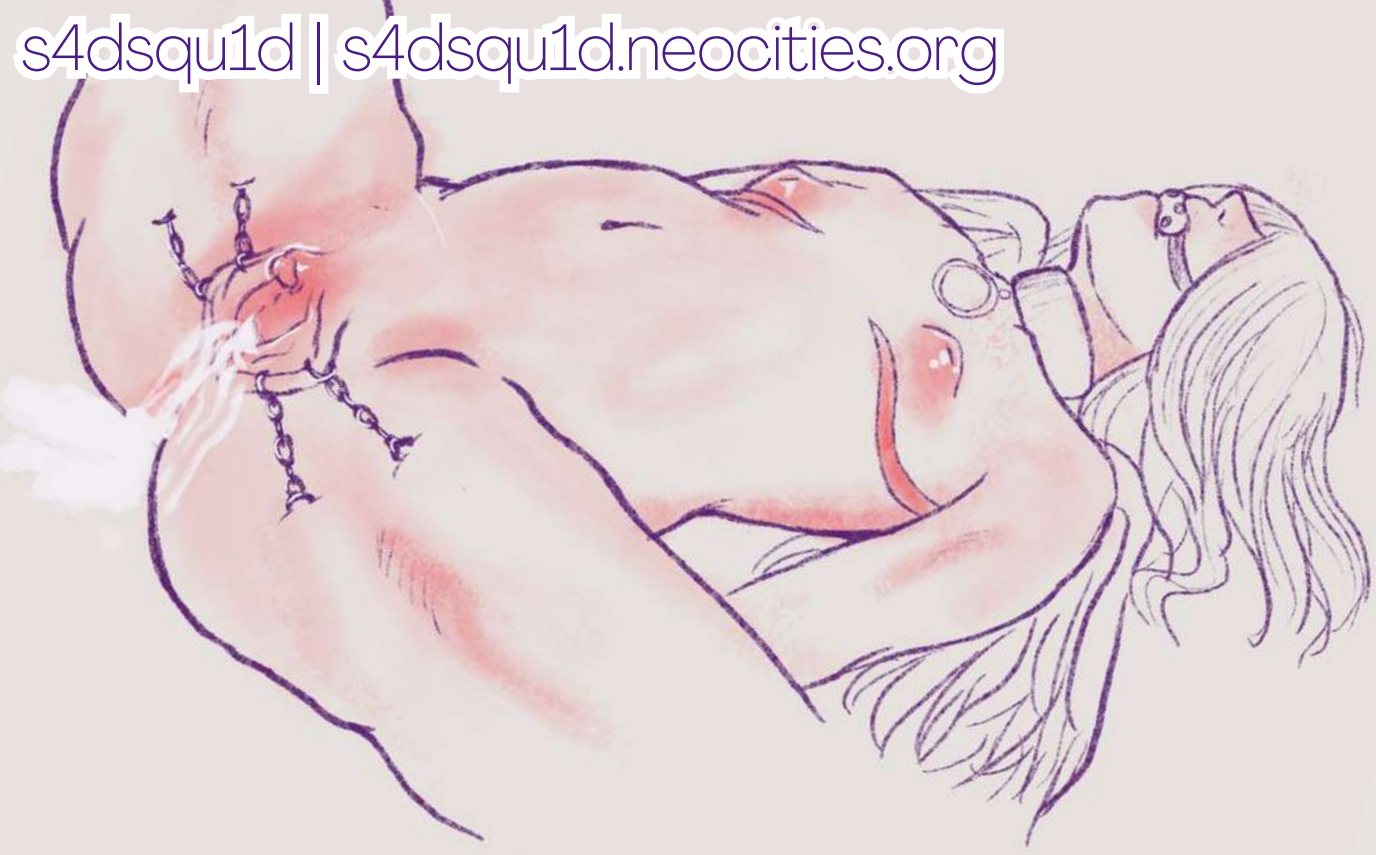
A Public Relief Pet life goes in cycles that last around a year. The pillory is the first step in it and it's main goal is to get them pregnant while exposing their pet parts for free use. They remain in this stage until the last stretch of pregnancy, when vaginal penetration becomes impossible

These pets are impregnated on the first day of their new cycle. The appropriate number of ovulations are induced before a vet blocks any further eggs from being released. That way the general public won't need to worry about putting too many babies on them. This might be obvious, but keep in mind that mating with a PRP on a breeding day may make them pregnant with your child. However, you won't need to worry about childcare or anything or the sort, as the baby's parentage is kept unknown.

PRPs on their first cycle will have their voice shut completely off and will be specially marked as such. They have not yet been trained and are still in the "breaking in" stage. They can act quite scared or angry, but don't worry, both their collar and the chains will restrict them so you'll be safe. We recommend you be as rough as possible with them to expedite their training!

More experienced PRFs will sometimes beg and shake their butts, most of them will be very happy with any caress or praise, so, if you prefer eager pets, we advise you to opt for those! Please check if the pet is safe for oral stimulation before inserting any body part on their mouths. This info, as well as total serving time, will be easily readable on their displayed file.





pillory pets

Although they are in a stage called "pillory", it doesn't necessarily mean they will be mounted on one. Other common forms of display include laying them down on flat surfaces while secured or hanging them against a wall. The most important aspect to keep in mind is that their legs will always remain spread open, with both their anus and vagina accessible. Any other part is optional for the display. This is usually decided by the trainers responsible for said pet, but first-years will remain in a regular pillory during the whole stage.

typical customizations

The default customization for pillory pets is spreader piercings on their labia! First-year pets will usually sport them by themselves, but more experienced ones will likely have plenty of other piercings decorating their bodies!



pillory rules

These rules applies to Public Reliefs in pillory stage only!

- Do not cause excessive damage to their skin or insides. As a rule of thumb, if it causes them to bleed more than a couple of drops of blood, it's not allowed;
- The only thing allowed inside their vaginal canal is semen and penises, **NO EXCEPTIONS**. General rules applies to mouth and anus, so keep other insertions there;
- Do not attempt to give them an uterine prolapse. If it happens accidentally, call maintenance immediatly;
- Do not remove customization items;

general rules

These rules applies to Public Reliefs in all stages!

- Do not cause permanent damage to the PRP, pay attention to their healing level to avoid that;
- Do not move them from their post;
- Do not hit their head against things or do anything that could otherwise cause brain damage. This also means eye penetration is **NOT** permitted;
- The only things allowed on their mouths are bodily fluids, water and ice treats, anything else is strictly forbidden;
- Don't do anything that could endager their lives;



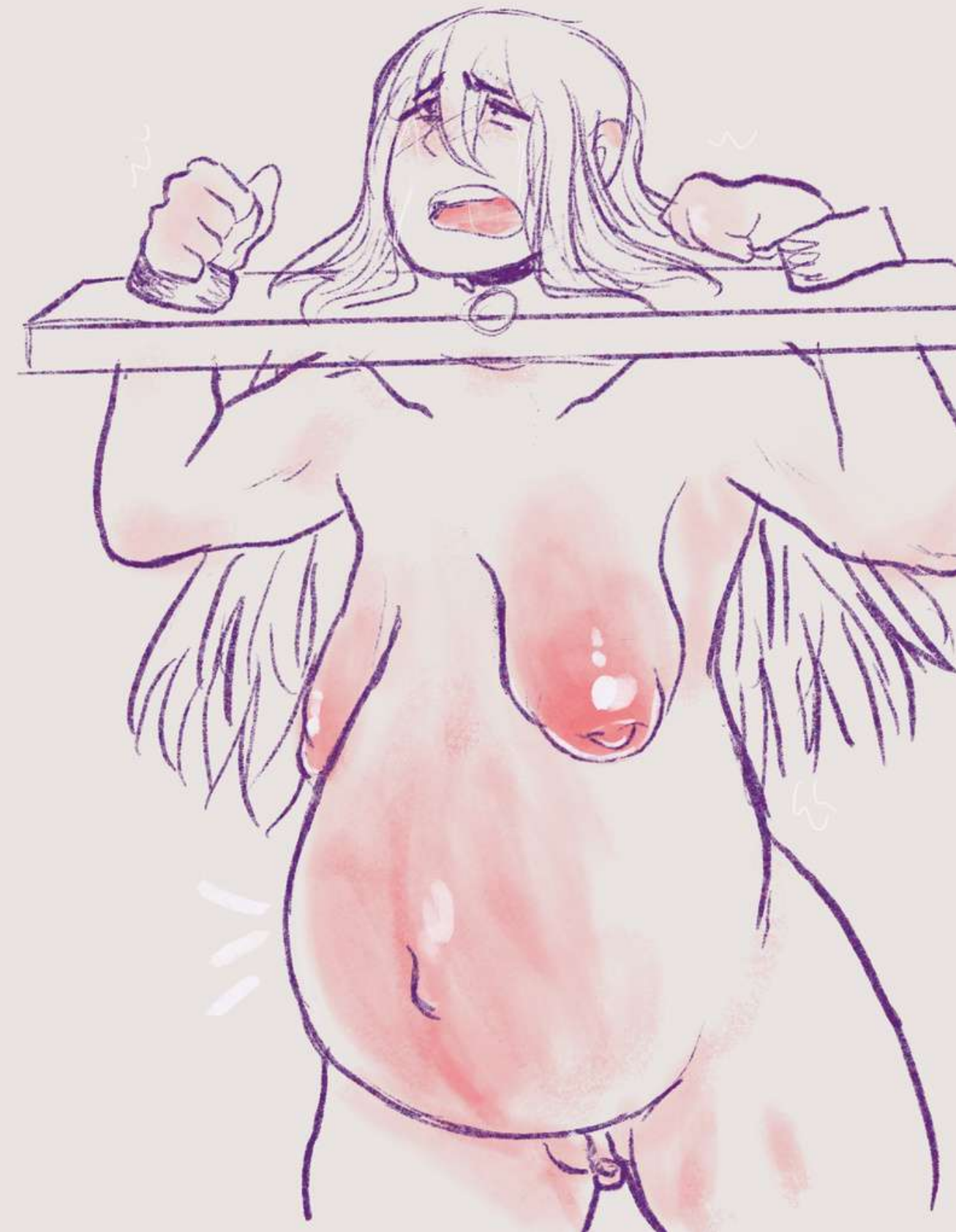
urinal pets

PRPs will move to the urinal stage once their pregnancies are far enough along that uterine insertion is no longer possible. In some cases, trainers can forego pregnancy and put them straight into urinal stage for an indeterminate amount of time.

In this stage, they are usually sought after by people with more aggressive urges as the rules are more relaxed. The name comes from the fact that they are usually stationed in public restrooms. Although it wasn't the original intent, some people do use them as literal urinals, so keep that in mind before touching them with your bare hands.

After their first cycle, every PRP has their digestive system mostly removed. This makes it easy for any liquid to pass through them, so it's not uncommon to use a PRPs mouth to urinate and have them relieve themselves on an actual urinal or doing the same via their rectum, where the pee will leave through their mouths.

A lot of pets become unruly on this stage, as it's usually where they have to endure more pain, so it's not uncommon for even experienced ones to be tied up. We recommend you only interact with urinal pets if you have some previous experience dealing with pets in general, as they can have erratic behaviours at times.



urinal pets

At this point, they are likely already producing plenty of milk, so please be careful when handling their breasts, as it could possibly spray out liquid.

Also, please don't worry about the babies! The fetuses' magical barriers are extremely strong, and it will only fail if the pet themselves dies, so as long as the PRPs live if not put at risk, feel free to use them as you wish!

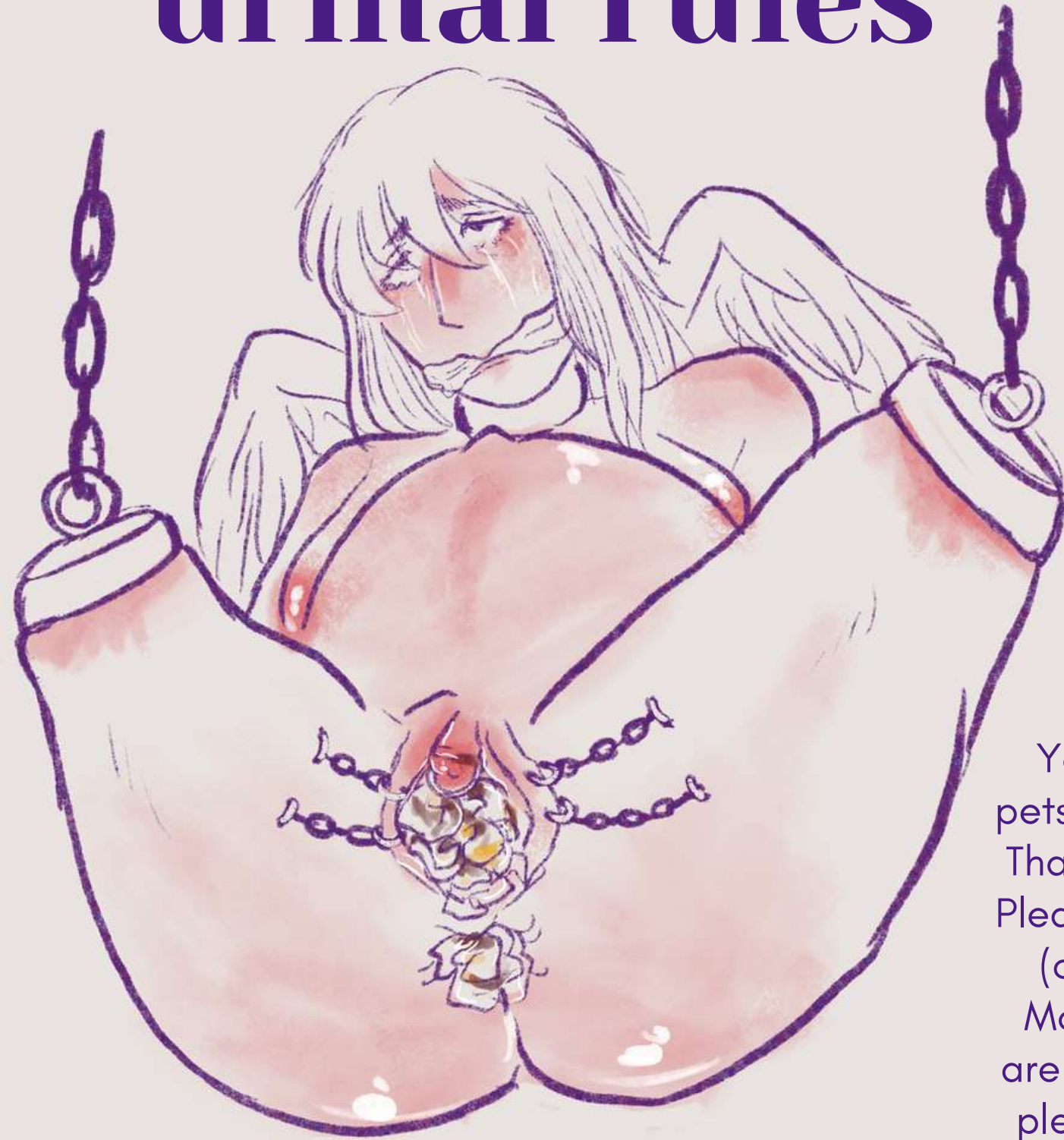


This stage is very important for our society. Everyone has violent or sadistic urges to some degree and these pets are trained to handle those in a safe, controlled environment. In this way, we protect the health and safety of our citizens, while giving our dear pets their much needed stimulation they need to live a happy life! So please don't worry about hurting them, they might pretend not to enjoy it if they haven't accepted their role yet, but all of them stop with the denial at some point. They are forced to live as people for the first 20 years of their life, so adapting to their real nature can sometimes be a bit hard, but it's for their own good!

Very obedient PRPs might have very minimal restraints and a bit of movement might be allowed. A pet only gets those liberties once they have a 95%+ score on submission, but we do recommend you keep caution around them as a safety measure, as all pets do still have some degree of unpredictability.

They are usually tasting cum and urine for most of the day, so PRPs in urinal stage are even more appreciative of ice treats! Most of them will be extra eager and obedient if you give them one or two.

urinal rules

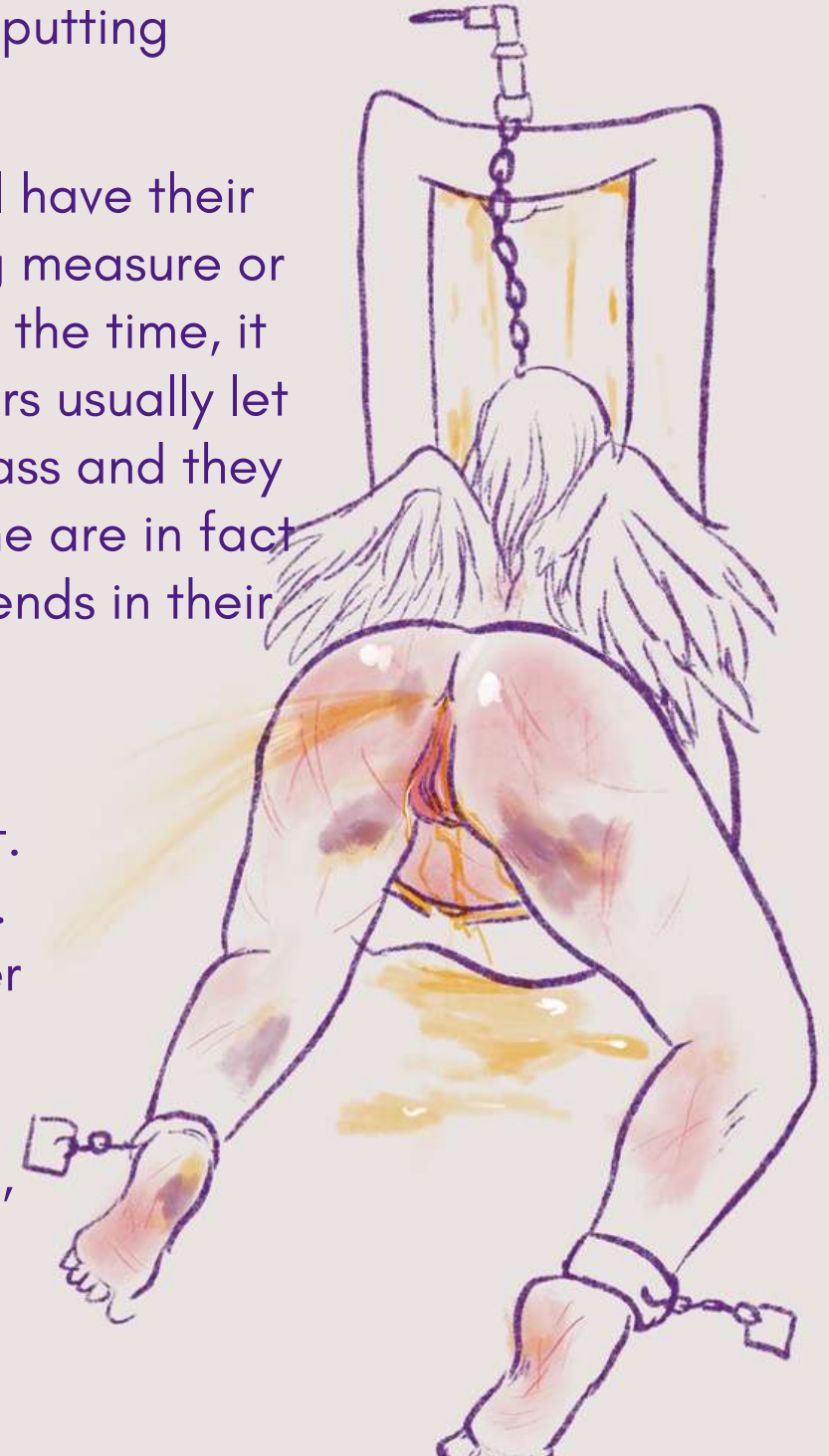


Rules for urinal pets are way more lax than both pillory and exhibit stage pets. Anything can be inserted in any of their holes and any amount of violence is allowed (as long as you follow the general rules or not putting their life in danger).

Sometimes, a pet in urinal stage will have their limbs amputated, either as a training measure or just for aesthetic purposes. Most of the time, it doesn't become permanent, as trainers usually let them grow again before five years pass and they can no longer regrow. Of course, some are in fact kept like that permanently, it all depends in their trainer's discretion.

You might notice some bathrooms the pets are stationed in have no trash basket. That is because a pet is fulfilling that role. Please make sure to insert any toilet paper (or any trash, for that matter) in them. Most of them will even thank you if they are well-trained enough! If they complain, please write it on their feedback box, so their trainer can correct that behaviour!

Your cooperation is vital!



exhibit

When a pet is around three weeks from their due date, they are moved to exhibit stage. In there, they aren't supposed to be touched at all, instead, they are just displayed in a nice way.

This is usually done in plazas, busy streets, bus stops, bathrooms, etc... They are usually protected by a glass, to avoid accidental touching. Amputation is also extremely common for this stage, as most exhibit contraptions don't work on intact limbs. This is also better on their health, as their energy won't go to useless limbs, and instead will go to nurturing their babies!

Of course, they are still supposed to entertain so various forms of stimuli can be applied on them. Their reactions tend to be quite cute, so please feel free to take pictures and videos as a keepsakes!

You can also leave them little messages of encouragement, even when they're incased, by either writing on the glass with the provided pens or speaking into the microphone. Ah, yes, the glass is soundproof so using the microphone is imperative if you want the pet to hear!

Once they go into labour, they will be immediately moved to the birthing section. They are being monitored for that, there's no need to alert anyone if you happen to witness it.





birthing

A PRP will usually give birth in a public place, very similar to their exhibit stage. However, there will be at least one vet and maintenance personnel watching at all times, should an emergence occur.

A lot of the times, the vet will use the opportunity to give out lectures about labour stages, standard procedures and how to properly care for a pet who is about to give birth, so, if you have a pregnant pet or intend to get yours to give you children eventually, attending these might be very useful!

They are also protected by a glass wall (not soundproof this time) and the babies are removed and taken into care as soon as they are born. The pet will likely not even see them, to mitigate the risk of harm coming to either.

Please be aware that the pet might tear and bleed a lot, especially when birthing demons, don't come unprepared or alone if you're squeamish about blood.

respite + maintenance

Respite is a short period of time where a PRP can rest a bit and heal up from the birthing process! This usually lasts no longer than a couple of weeks and during this time, they are kept isolated and some procedures may be done on them to better prepare them for their next cycle. Some common ones might include limb removal (or renewal), breast resetting (it's cut out so it grows back to how it was pre-pregnancy), eye removal, de-teething (only on particularly stubborn pets), de-nailing, wing pinioning, clit removal, labia removal and many piercing arrangements.

Digestive system removal is always done after their first full cycle and there's no need to repeat it, as it's made not to ever grow back.

training

After respite, PRPs will go through plenty of training sessions, both to get them accustomed to their role (at the beginning of their new lives) or, further in, to shape them into good entertainment. This done using both their strengths and user feedback as guides.

Some body modifications can be used as a teaching tool during a cycle or a way to correct behaviour that can't be fully addressed on their short training time.

It takes from one to three months of training for them to restart their new cycle.

The public cannot tweak a PRPs collar setting, as it's also a tool for their trainers to use. Things like increasing and decreasing sensitivity, blocking out orgasms and completely shutting off their movements are very common measures that are taken into the full length of their cycle.





pet numbness

Some of them, however, can't handle the stress and pressure of training and end up "fully numb" as they are popularly called.

These pets, at that point, are just hollow shells, looking and acting like they are brain dead, never responding to any stimuli. If a pet ever reaches this stage, they are spayed and left at a pillory or urinal post indefinitely.

Some people do like using them specifically for their lack of responsiveness, so they aren't completely useless, but it's still something our trainers work hard to avoid, as we believe that a pet in this state is definitely not as happy as they could be.

If you ever come across one, please don't try to "wake them up" or hurting them to make them react. They won't, so unless you're doing it for your own amusement, don't waste your time.
